Executive Summary

This report focuses on the Arkansas 2018 State Legislative Republican primary. It uses financial data to identify the "Players" in Arkansas politics and the candidates they elect.

The take away is clear:

Establishment Republican candidates, whose votes favor bigger government, were elected with the large and unified financial support of Arkansas' most established long-time special interest groups (which hold no party allegiance.)

Conservative, limited government groups have a way to go before they see more of their limited government candidates win elections in Arkansas GOP primaries.

The reader is encouraged to use these findings as a blueprint for predicting future votes by these elected officials as various special interest issues come before the Legislature in January 2019.

If you have ever wondered why an elected official votes a certain way, Follow the Money!

Methodology

To understand who funded selected 2018 Statehouse Republican primary elections, Conduit for Commerce, Inc. collected contribution records from Arkansas' Secretary of State Financial Disclosures website: https://www.sos.arkansas.gov/elections/financial-disclosure. Next, candidate, individual donor, and Political Action Committee (PAC) information was sorted and tagged.

These donations were then analyzed, cross-referencing PAC filings, lobbyist filings, and other research of the individuals and entities contributing. This allowed for greater transparency and a peak at the special interests behind the political contributions.

Then, all collected data was organized by category. This analysis also allowed grouping between similar interests, entities, and persons. For example, healthcare interests were grouped together. Further analysis determined if the contributor was in or out of state and whether in or out of the district of the candidate. The full analysis and sorting allowed for the grouping together of "Special Interests" donated significant amounts across campaigns.



LIMITED GOVERNMENT

Senate District 16 Republican Primary 2018

The death of Sen. Greg Standridge (SD16) left this seat vacant. The special election primaries to fill the term were held February 13. Republican candidates were Breanne Davis, Bob Bailey, and Luke Heffley. GOP voter turnout for the primary was excellent at 5,621--Davis--2,440 (43%); Bailey--2,327 (41.4%); and Heffley--854 (15.2%). The GOP runoff was held a month later with 7,719 voting (increase of 37%.) Davis won with 4,266 (55%) to Bailey's 3,453 (45%). Democrats voted in this GOP primary.

Contributions are for both elections. Davis, a political friend of ex-Sen Michael Lamoreaux, was aggressively supported by Gov. Asa Hutchinson, healthcare industry, State Chamber of Commerce, and other long-established Arkansas special interest groups. Bailey, a political newcomer, was supported by the limited government PACs of Commerce in Action.

Being an open Senate seat with candidates on both "sides" of the GOP (big government establishment and limited government conservative), this SD16 race is the poster child for how special interests in AR work together, regardless of party affiliation, to elect a candidate least likely to vote for smaller government or significant changes in Statehouse policies.

Senate District 19 Republican Primary 2018

Rep. James Sturch defeated incumbent, Sen. Linda Collins-Smith in the Arkansas State Senate District 19 Republican primary election on May 22, 2018. Rep. James Sturch is a current Republican member of the Arkansas House of Representatives, representing District 63. He was first elected to the chamber in 2014. Sen. Linda Collins-Smith had represented District 19 since 2014, and previously served in the Arkansas House of Representatives, representing District 80 from 2011 to 2013. Sturch won Independence county overwhelmingly, while Collins-Smith won all of the remaining counties in the district. While Sturch and Collins-Smith both received financial support across the spectrum, Collins-Smith has been recognized by conservative groups around the state for her strong fiscal and social conservative voting records. Collins-Smith was number two on the 2017 Conduit for Commerce scorecard. Sturch was well supported by Gov. Asa Hutchinson and the Healthcare industry.



House District 53 Republican Primary 2018

Rep. Dan Sullivan defeated Dr. Cole Peck in the 2018 GOP primary election for HD53. Peck and his wife are both medical doctors, thus Peck was well-funded by healthcare interests, assisting him in outraising the incumbent Sullivan campaign. Rep. Sullivan was first elected to HD53 in 2014. Sullivan was one of the few conservative Republican candidates to hold off challenges in the 2018 primary election season. Sullivan has been recognized by conservative organizations around the state for his consistent conservative voting record, ranking first on the Conduit for Commerce legislative scorecard for 2017.

Senate District 5 Republican Primary 2018

State Rep. Bob Ballinger defeated incumbent Sen. Bryan King in the May 2018 Republican primary election. Rep. Ballinger currently represents District 97 in the Arkansas House of Representatives, where he was first elected in 2012. Sen. King was first elected to the state senate in 2012. King was also a Republican member of the Arkansas House of Representatives, representing District 91 from 2007 to 2013. During that period, he served as the minority leader. Ballinger announced in the summer of 2017 his plans to challenge King for the senate seat. King stated in the fall 2017 he would not seek re-election but changed his mind in February 2018 during the filing period. Ballinger received significant financial support from healthcare interests, including the nursing home industry. Ballinger was the House sponsor of Issue 1, tort reform. Sen. King was ranked the top fiscal conservative in the state by Conduit for Commerce for his voting record in the 2017 legislative session, receiving a special award for his Disclosure bill which was defeated but would have disclosed financial relationships between the Healthcare industry and individual legislators. Rep. Ballinger was supported by Gov. Asa Hutchinson.



Senate District 8 Republican Primary 2018


Two elections were held in 2018 for the state Senate District 8 seat in the Fort Smith area. One was a special election to fill the remainder of former state Sen. Jake Files' seat after he resigned following indictment for wire fraud. In the special election, Frank Glidewell defeated Denny Altes. Rep. Mat Pitsch was not eligible to run for the special election due to currently being a state representative.

The primary election for the full four-year term was held the same day as the special election That election was between state Rep. Mathew Pitsch, Frank Glidewell, and Denny Altes. Glidewell placed first with 4,193 votes (39.8%), Pitsch second with 3,641 votes (34.6%), and Altes third with 2,693 votes (25.6%). Glidewell and Pitsch then faced off in a runoff election in June. Pitsch won the runoff election by 84 votes with 2,070 votes (51%) to Glidewell's 1,991 votes (49%). Glidewell was mostly self-funded with some support from the Commerce in Action PACs who support conservative, limited government candidates. Rep. Pitsch was supported by Gov. Asa Hutchinson and the state Chamber of Commerce.

Bob Bailey and Breanne Davis defeated Luke Heffley in the Republican primary. Davis defeated Bailey in the Republican primary runoff. Breanne Davis (R) defeated Teresa Gallegos (D) in the general election.

State legislators are paid \$40,188 annually plus they are paid per diem for each day they attend any meeting at the Capitol at the rate of \$155 for legislators who live more than 50 miles from the Capitol and \$59 for legislators who live less than 50 miles from the Capitol. In addition to their salary and per diem per meeting, they are reimbursed for mileage and travel at the rate of 54.5 cents per mile.

State Senate are elected to four-year terms with term limits.

The Arkansas Legislature is one of 15 state legislatures with term limits. Arkansas Senators are subject to no more than 16 years in either or both legislative chambers but considering years for re-apportionments, could be as long as 22 years.

Service in the legislature is considered part-time.

Issue 3 on the 2018 November ballot shortens term limits for legislators
